Minutes of the North Logan City 1 City Council 2 Held on May 3, 2007 3 At the North Logan City Library, North Logan, Utah 4 5 6 7 The meeting was called to order by Mayor Watkins at 6:30 p.m. 8 9 Council members present were: Scott Galbraith, Trent Wentz, Elaine Nelson and Steve Soulier. 10 Others present were: Don Younker, Jon Keller, Lloyd Berentzen, Carlos F. Andersen, Val Potter, 11 Travis Italasano, John Italasano, Greg Nielson, Kim Hawkes, Scott Wyatt, Terrel Huppi, Cordell 12 13 Batt, Pat Northenor, Bruce Henderson, Bryon Geddes, Lydia Embry, Jeff Jorgensen and Marie 14 Wilhelm. 15 16 The Pledge of Allegiance was led by Mayor Watkins. An invocation was given by Steve Soulier. 17 18 19 Adoption of Agenda 20 Steve Soulier made a motion to adopt the agenda as presented. Elaine Nelson seconded the 21 motion. A vote was called for and the motion passed unanimously. 22 23 Approval and Follow-up of Minutes of April 19, 2007 24 Trent Wentz made a motion to approve the minutes as presented. Elaine Nelson seconded the 25 motion. A vote was called for and the motion passed unanimously. 26 27 Follow-up Trent Wentz mentioned line 41 of the previous meeting's minutes regarding the placement of 28 2500 North between 1200 East and 1600 East. Jeff Jorgensen explained that the Planning 29 30 Commission is going to get a work group together to include the owners of the adjacent 31 properties, and discuss that issue. 32 **Review of Action Items** 33 34 Mayor Watkins said that a new list was not sent out this week, and that there were no significant 35 changes from the previous list they had received. 36 37 **New Business** 38 Open Public Input Forum (Citizens are invited to schedule one of two five-minute times through 39 the City Recorder) 40 No citizens were scheduled to speak at this meeting. 41 42 Consider a proposed resolution establishing policy for reimbursement of expenses for city council 43 members and Mayor. 44 Trent Wentz made a motion to pass resolution 07-03 [establishing policy for reimbursement of expenses for city council members and the Mayor). Steve Soulier seconded the motion. 45 46 47 Elaine Nelson said she really wanted to know why the change was happening, since Mayor Potter set and approved this pay years ago. She said if Mayor Watkins' expenses were 48 49 exceeding his allotment because of economic development; then the money should come out of the economic development budget. She said she does not feel that a new resolution should be 50 51 established, which would change the policy forever. 52 Jeff Jorgensen explained that tax laws preclude the Mayor from receiving reimbursement both 53 ways. 54 Elaine Nelson asked why the Mayor has a problem with his pay.

- Jeff Jorgensen said that if this resolution gets passed, then the Mayor will get reimbursed for expenses rather than having an expense allowance; and that the reimbursement expenses will
- 57 come out of the appropriate budgets depending on what the expense was incurred for (i.e. which department or project).
- 59 Elaine Nelson asked why there should be a change when it has been the same way for years.
- Jeff Jorgensen explained that the Federal law states that both reimbursement procedures are not allowed concurrently; i.e. one cannot be reimbursed for minor expenses and receive an expense
- allowance for minor expenses, at the same time.
- 63 Scott Galbraith asked how much of a variance there was between what he has been receiving
- 64 and what his actual expenses are. Mayor Watkins said that the cell phone he uses primarily for
- 65 city use is costing him \$100 per month alone, [which is the amount of his current monthly
- expense allowance]. Per a question from Scott Galbraith, the Mayor explained that he regularly
- incurs additional expenses when he travels to Salt Lake City for various reasons, including for the
- 68 EDC (Economic Development Corporation), Utah League, etc. and that he travels there several
- 69 times monthly. He said there are additional expenses he incurs carrying out in-town business
- tasks that the City Council members do not typically perform.
- Trent Wentz said that the resolution states that every year, both the position of mayor and each city council member would be required to determine which expense program he or she is going to go with.
- Scott Galbraith asked if there was a mayor in the future who was less reserved with spending, if
- this resolution change would create a problem financially. Jeff Jorgensen said that the City
- Council appropriates money into the budget and that if a mayor goes over the budget, he would
- be breaking the law. Steve Soulier asked if that was the only check and balance system in place,
- and asked if the mayor would be allowing his own expenses. Jeff Jorgensen said that he, as the
- 79 financial officer for the city, checks those expenses and does so within the budget.
 - The City Council discussed wanting to accommodate the Mayor's expenses while being able to put a cap on the amount, as well. The City Council agreed to allow the Mayor \$2400 per year, in allowable expense reimbursements, and that anything above that amount would require approval from the City Council. The City Council agreed that the resolution needed to be re-written and

would have to cause the motion to fail.

A vote was called and the motion failed with one in favor (Steve Soulier) and three opposed (Scott Galbraith, Elaine Nelson and Trent Wentz).

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6:45 Public Hearing to receive public input on a proposed ordinance correcting tables within the zoning ordinance and the subdivision ordinance in order to be consistent with recent changes to the set-back requirements as delineated in the subdivision ordinance. This ordinance makes no changes to the set-back requirements previously passed by ordinance; it only makes necessary corrections where tables are not consistent with each other. Following the public hearing the city council may consider approval of the ordinance under consideration.

Mayor Watkins opened and then closed the public hearing at 6:47 p.m., as there were no forthcoming public comments.

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Scott Galbraith referred to the new bonus density ordinance and said that it may not make sense in terms of building occurring on smaller lots, and that the set back tables may need to be adjusted to accommodate this issue.

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The City Council agreed to have Jeff Jorgensen and Cordell Batt adjust the tables and have it ready for vote at the next City Council meeting.

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- Consider a proposed ordinance making changes to the city's nuisance ordinance and the administrative remedies ordinance.
- Trent Wentz asked if the Nuisance Ordinance would cover the protective strip situation next to the aforementioned Do's property, as there are weeds, piles of old grass and weeds, as well as an

- 109 old trailer and some cars. Steve Soulier said there are two places within the ordinance that would
- deal with that situation, including "Weed Regulations" as well as the section regarding rubbish
- removal. Steve Soulier said that if the cars are operable, however, it would not be covered in the
- 112 ordinance.
- 113 Elaine Nelson mentioned a situation near her home where a citizen has filled their entire two-acre
- piece of property with logs and wood pieces; as well as some "junk "cars; and further stated that
- she has other adjacent homeowners who have approached her who feel that the area looks
- "atrocious" and have asked her what can be done because the site is lowering their property
- 117 values.
- Steve Soulier said one of the things that the committee is *not* trying to do with this ordinance is to
- define what a property should or should not look like. He said the intent of the ordinance was to
- 120 affect changes related to health and safety and that if the situation that Elaine referred to falls
- under that category in the opinion of the Enforcement Officer, that something might be able to be
- done. He said, however, that if it simply is a matter of not liking what someone has put in their
- backyard for decoration, for example, then trying to determine that and when to cross that line,
- 124 can be a very dangerous thing to do. He said if it can truly be established that something is
- diminishing property values, the point can then be made.
- Scott Galbraith referred to his yard which he said he has worked very hard on and feels that it is a
- fairly good looking yard; however, he has left the back portion in a more natural, native state,
- where it leads up to the mountains. He asked if in doing so, it would be considered a nuisance
- under the new ordinance.
- 130 Trent Wentz said he felt what Scott described would not be considered a nuisance and that
- hopefully the City Council would always be prudent enough to allow property owners their own
- rights. He said the ordinance is really an effort to protect the citizens from the negative impact in
- 133 various situations.
- 134 Steve Soulier also addressed a prior question that Trent Wentz raised about whether or not an
- 135 "abandoned vehicle" included one that someone might actually be restoring. Steve Soulier said
- that that type of car still needs to be put away and out of sight, e.g. in a garage.

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Steve Soulier made a motion to adopt the ordinance changing the city's nuisance ordinance.

Scott Galbraith seconded the motion.

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Scott Galbraith stated that this ordinance is a very good attempt at creating a working nuisance ordinance; but wants to ensure that there is flexibility if the City Council finds that something in the ordinance needs to be adjusted, to which the City Council agreed

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A vote was called for and the motion passed unanimously.

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Consider concept plan for a 0.55 acre, two lot subdivision at approximately 2147 N. 1200 E. This subdivision, as proposed, includes a "flag lot".

As the Do's were unable to attend the meeting, the City Council agreed to postpone this item until the next City Council meeting that the Do's would be able to attend.

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Reports from city officers, boards, and committees

- 153 Jeff Jorgensen mentioned that he has a received a request from an individual who wants to
- establish a hot dog stand in order to sell hot dogs at soccer games, baseball games, etc., in
- Logan as well as North Logan. Jeff Jorgensen explained that the applicant will need to get a
- business license and a health certificate, as is typically required.
- 157 Scott Galbraith asked if the city could collect a small fee/percentage of the vendor's sales. Trent
- Wentz asked if there was an issue with liability for the city if an accident or illness occurs on city
- property. Elaine Nelson mentioned that Hyde Park did the wise thing by building a permanent
- structure at their park facility to be available for vending; which Jeff Jorgensen said at one time
- such a facility had been in North Logan City's plans, as well. Steve Soulier said he did not think it
- was a problem now, but that this issue should be discussed with the Parks Board, who

establishes such things for the long term. Terrel Huppi said there may be an issue of allowing too many vendors. The City Council discussed various ways of handling this; and agreed to allow the hot dog stand.

Elaine Nelson distributed some information she obtained about water rights and issues to the City Council members.

Steve Soulier mentioned the packet he had distributed regarding the library and the statistics reflected therein. He said he continually sees the library getting greatly utilized with large numbers of citizens visiting the library, and that the city should be very proud of the library and its use. Steve Soulier also mentioned the library book sale; as well as the money brought in from various items such as the sale of used books at the library, candy-machine sales, etc., which all goes back to the library, and is maintained by Joe Hawkes.

 Elaine Nelson asked Mayor Watkins about his forthcoming Las Vegas trip. She asked him to explain what his vision is in going down there in order to make sure that the City Council concurs with what he is planning to do. She mentioned a business that she said Mayor Watkins mentioned as a potential incoming business (a factory outlet) and said that that does not meet her vision of what the residents want for the city.

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Mayor Watkins explained that there will be roughly 40,000 people attending the International Shopping Centers and Retailers Conference in Las Vegas, which will represent companies from all over the nation. He said he is a member and trustee of the Economic Development Corporation of Utah (EDC) and that the city's prorated cost to be part of the EDC's booth at the conference is roughly \$1200 or so; that it costs around \$300 to attend the conference; in addition to rooming expenses. He explained that for those cities that attend, the EDC sets up a property book which includes an economic profile for each city. He said each city that attends gets six pages dedicated to that city which gives details about the city including demographics, economic profile, growth opportunities, as well as available land. He said North Logan will have five pages with two pages in the book dedicated to describing North Logan in positive terms; and three pages detailing specific properties, including the CRG commercial property and its leasing opportunities; as well as the Faulkner Development commercial development/mixed use area.

He also said that Faulkner Development has set up appointments with some potential retailers, including Costco, a national sports company, as well as possible others. He also said that the Factory Outlet chain had contact the Mayor, based upon the profile for North Logan that had go

He said he basically acts as an advocate for North Logan to show that our city is a market which is looking to attract and encourage retail development to come to the city. He said the value for him to be at the conference is to show the positive approach the city takes in wanting to be there as an advocate to attract quality development and jobs to North Logan. He

He said his vision is very simple and believes that it is the vision of the council and is that we want to attract quality jobs followed with quality services; as well as to attract fine restaurants to North

Elaine Nelson said she just wants to make sure we get developments that fit, and does not feel that Factory Outlets fit what our residents want.

Elect replacement city council member to fill vacancy on the council. (May include executive session (closed) to consider the competency of individuals.)

Per Mayor Watkins's request, Scott Wyatt explained the rules and requirements for being allowed to serve on the City Council. He also said that a candidate cannot be interviewed in closed session; that they can only be interviewed in the public meeting. He said that the City Council members can discuss the candidate's competency in closed session; but are then required to return to open session in order to vote. He also explained that only City Council members are allowed to vote, unless there is a tie, for which the Mayor can cast the deciding vote.

Mayor Watkins explained that the two candidates are Lloyd Berentzen and Bryon Geddes, and asked the candidates to give their presentation to the council in that order; and asked the City

222 223 224 225 226	when this term was up at the end of the	yd Berentzen expressed his desire to run, as well as stating that he intended to run again en this term was up at the end of the year. He answered questions from the City Council arding various issues of the City Center Plan, budget issues, and dealing with provocative ues.	
227 228 229 230 231 232 233 234	Bryon Geddes gave his presentation stating that his desire to run was out of a desire to serve this community; and further explained his abilities and the various issues he believes face this community including the growth of the community, the quality of life and economic health, parks and recreational areas, shopping and restaurants, well-paying jobs, etc. He also stated that his intention would definitely be to run again when the term was up; but would be based on whether or not there is the belief that he is doing the best job in representing the constituents, and what the existing attitude is with his colleagues. Trent Wentz stated that he feels that the city is very lucky to have two candidates of this caliber applying for what can be a difficult position; and said he appreciates seeing citizens willing to make that commitment.		
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239 240 241 242	Scott Galbraith made a motion to move into executive closed session in order to discuss the candidates, at 8:05 p.m. Elaine Nelson seconded the motion. A vote was called for and the motion passed unanimously.		
243 244 245	Steve Soulier made a motion to move back into open session at 8:11 p.m. Scott Galbraith seconded the motion. A vote was called for and the motion passed unanimously. Lloyd Berentzen won with a majority vote with Trent Wentz, Elaine Nelson and Scott Galbraith voting for Lloyd Berentzen; and Steve Soulier voting for Bryon Geddes. Steve Soulier made a motion to adjourn the meeting. Scott Galbraith seconded the motion. A vote was called for and the motion passed unanimously.
