What's Happening in City Council?

The City Council meetings for the month of August will be on the second and fourth Wednesdays, August 12th and 26th. The City Council meetings start at 6:30 pm and are held in the meeting room at the North Logan Library.

During the August meetings the council is planning on beginning the process of transferring some small publicly owned pieces of land to adjacent property owners. The types of pieces of land being considered for transfer are where it makes more sense to have the adjacent property owner take care of the piece rather than the City, pieces like some drainage corridors, other storm water control elements such as drainage basins, and some small open spaces that are not big enough to be used by the public for a park but can be landscaped and taken care of by the adjoining property owner. The intent of these transfers is to maintain the same open space that was originally established but to allow those nearby to take responsibility for the upkeep rather than expending City resources to so do. A recently adopted ordinance provides provisions whereby these transfers can take place including looking at the relative value of the property versus the cost of continued maintenance by the City, public hearings to receive input on any transfer, and other ways to ensure the interests of the public are best served. Look to the newspaper and the City website for details on when public hearings on any of these proposed transfers may be scheduled.

At the time of writing up the input for this newsletter there were no other planned agenda items for either of the August meetings.

Look for the official council agendas as they are posted at the City office and on the State of Utah Public Notice Website at <http://www.utah.gov/pmn/index.html>. The Herald Journal is given a copy of the official agenda as well and they normally print it in the newspaper a day or two before the meeting.

A huge thank you to all scouts, wards, church groups, the history committee, Youth City Council, North Logan Royalty, and any individuals who participated in this year's Pioneer Day festivities, including the parade, Pioneers and Patriots Program, and Charity Barbeque. A great time was had by all!



NOTICE: We are implementing phase 2 - the yellow level - Moderate drought, from our Water Shortage Management Policies and Procedures Plan.

Target	Water Use Reduction: A city wide reduction of water usage of 15-20%.
Reduction Strategies	<p>Public Education and Encouragement:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Water users must cut back exterior watering by 15% (ie. users shall water no more than three days per week) • Commercial, Industrial, and Research Buildings cut back by 15% on all water usage (both inside/outside usage) • No washing of cars using culinary water at a home/residence • No spraying sidewalks, driveways..etc. with a hose • No excessive or wasteful watering • City's splash pad will be reduced to 6 hours/day <p>The City may also monitor water usage through real time water meter reports. If a resident, commercial, industrial, or research related water user is using excessive amounts of culinary water they will be subject to the Enforcement standards.</p>

Delinquent Utility Accounts

Accounts that are not paid by the 15th of the second month are subject to disconnect. Previously, shut off notices have been sent by mail. Soon, notification of disconnect will be sent via a voice message through phone rather than a pink notice by mail.



All utility customers of North Logan City should have their current phone number on file with the City. If you have not updated our files with your current phone number and you are on the disconnect list, you may not receive the notification and could wake up one morning with no water.

Take Care when Taking Care of the Pesky Pests

Home owners in North Logan can help reduce contamination in our storm water systems through proper pesticide storage and application techniques. In most of our city, the storm water collection systems include our canals which eventually empty into the Bear River. Pesticides in storm water runoff directly affect the health of aquatic organisms. Their presence in drinking water also threatens human health. Insecticides, such as diazinon and chlorpyrifos, are of greatest concern because even at low levels they can harm aquatic organisms. A recent U.S. Geological Survey of urban streams found that some of the more commonly used household and garden insecticides occurred at higher frequencies and concentrations in urban streams than in agricultural streams (USGS, 1999). The study also found that insecticide concentrations frequently exceeded USEPA guidelines for protecting aquatic life.

Homeowners applying insect and weed killer to their lawns and gardens are the biggest source of pesticides contaminating urban streams (which in our case would be the canals). Every year, they apply an average of 5 to 7 pounds of pesticides to their well-maintained lawns (Schueler, 1995). Pesticide pollution prevention plans try to limit the adverse effects of insecticides and herbicides. There are many ways to get information on chemical-free alternative pest control techniques and to learn how to determine appropriate pesticide dosages.
